Adjective/

A word that describes somebody or something. Adjectives come before a noun or after verbs.

Old, white, busy, careful, horrible.

Adverb

Give extra meaning to a verb.

She's really nice.

Many adverbs are formed by adding 'ly' to an adjective e.g. quickly.

Clause/

A group of words forming part of a sentence or a whole sentence

Hilary yawned.

A clause contains a noun and a verb: Hilary = noun yawned = verb,

Complex Sentence

A sentence with a main clause and a subordinate clause.

When it began to rain, the children came in from the playground.

subordinate clause

main clause (it can stand alone).

Compound Sentence

Two or more clauses joined together by a conjunction

Hilary yawed because she was tired.
